

New Zealand Dyslexia-Friendly Quality Mark

Ako Aotearoa and the Tertiary Education Commission (TEC) are proud to make available the New Zealand Dyslexia-Friendly Quality Mark (DFQM) – the only mark of its kind in the southern hemisphere.

The Quality Mark recognises organisations that take a strategic approach to creating an inclusive environment for learners, trainees, or clients with dyslexia. It is designed to promote appropriate support measures and practical guidance.

The DFQM is awarded to organisations that measure their practices against a set of DFQM standards in four key areas:

- » leadership and management
- » the quality of teaching and learning
- » the teaching and learning environment provided for learners
- » the quality of the organisation's relationships with internal and external stakeholders.

The Quality Mark is awarded for three years and can be renewed after this period.

The DFQM benefits the sector and learners

Learners, trainees, or clients with dyslexia will be assured that an organisation with the DFQM is a safe place for them, where their needs are understood and met. Here is some feedback from learners who benefit from the DFQM in organisations:

- >> It has created a warm, non-judgmental, and friendly environment
- >> Learning is consolidating, and my confidence is growing
- » I feel safe to be myself
- I increased my knowledge of dyslexia, which helped my learning
- >> Knowing I have dyslexia is a weight off my shoulders
